


The GV Fire Corps started in 2006 with a dozen local residents interested in volunteering to help the Green Valley Fire District

with day-to-day, non-emergent calls, such as desert pests and chirping smoke alarms. In addition, they offered to help with deliveries and errands, shuttling vehicles and supplies, clerical support, lock box installations, and support to firefighter training cycles.

Volunteer service includes a five-day-per-week coverage for our Smoke Alarm Battery and Replacement Programs, monitoring and replacing batteries in residential smoke alarms, as well as installing new A/C powered, battery back-up smoke alarms in local homes.

Fire Corps has over 75 volunteer members who work in the Field or Administration, and they have become an invaluable asset, both to the district and the community. In 2012, our Fire Corps was the recipient of the National Fire Corps Award of Excellence, for the best Fire Corps in the country. Recently, GV Fire Corps was awarded the Governor's Volunteers Award for "Service to the Community".

With its efficient cooling system and revolutionary operating system, the machine assists in making many formerly unrepairable pieces like new again.

Melicia enrolled at the Gemologist Institute of America and did her training both online and in New York City. The Institute offers an in-depth, hands-on springboard into many careers.




Master Goldsmith Patrick Contreras demonstrates the technique he uses with the OROTIG Laser Welder.

easure the amount of time volunteers give to the Community Food Bank of Southern Arizona and the total will likely surprise you.

Each year, volunteers give nearly 100,000 hours of their time to help the Food Bank run.

In Green Valley, Judy gives a few hours each week at the front desk of the Green Valley Resource Center helping people check in, answering questions, and welcoming the public. "I like volunteering at the Green Valley Food Bank because I feel that I'm helping, in a small way, to be sure that people aren't going hungry. It's also important to me to give back to the local community," she says.

Her thoughts are echoed by Susan, another regular volunteer in Green Valley. "I've been volunteering at the Green Valley/Amado Food Banks for almost five years. What attracted me to volunteering at the Food Bank was their mission "feeding the hungry today, and building a healthy, hunger-free tomorrow" was a mission that I embrace and wanted to support. What I love about working at the Foodbank is the interaction with clients. Each day I hope to make a difference by helping someone in need and showing that we care."

Volunteers do this important work not only in Green Valley, but across southern Arizona in the five counties where the Community Food Bank operates.

They work in many different roles. Volunteers help distribute food in remote rural locations from Ajo to Bowie to Thatcher. They portion senior meals going out at Caridad Community Kitchen, help pull weeds and maintain Nuestra Tierra Learning Garden, and do a variety of jobs that allow the Community Food Bank to serve people.

In what may be one of their most critical roles, volunteers help assemble food boxes that go out across Southern Arizona. Last year



they packed more than 400,000 boxes with non-perishables. This assembly line process runs five mornings a week in Tucson.

The work typically starts about 8:30 with volunteers checking learning in, basic safety procedures, and taking a place on the line. The variety of food changes, so it may be canned veggies, bagged rice, or canned soup they're handling for the morning. Once the line starts, so does

the music, and the action begins!

A regular volunteer, Terry takes his place at the start of the line building boxes three days a week. It's repetitive work, but it is where he wants to be. "This is relaxing to me," he says. "There are a lot of nice people working here. I like helping people and

like someone said, this is almost like going into Zen mode for me."

The boxes make their way down the assembly line and the full boxes go through a taping machine where they are sealed,

Cats are purring and dogs are wagging their tails in gratitude! If it were not for the multitude of caring volunteers who work at The Animal League of Green Valley (TALGV), many homeless cats and dogs would never have the chance of finding a loving home. By showering the animals with affection and kindness, volunteers give many pets hope for a second chance. Volunteers walk, train and socialize dogs. Others are cleaning kennels. Cat handlers scoop litter boxes, medicate and socialize the cats. Both cat and dog volunteers interact with the public by showing animals and sharing information about them. TALGV is always on the lookout for more compassionate dog and cat volunteers, especially handlers for the larger, stronger dogs. We also always need volunteers who are willing to clean.

At TALGV you may hear a story about an animal that may break your heart, but in the next instance, you will hear a story that will make your heart soar. Every adoption of a cat or dog is a reason to celebrate. 





The Town of Sahuarita's Newest Park is Now Open!

yith the official Grand Opening on March 27, 2024, The Town of Sahuarita, along with partners from Freeport-McMoRan, San Xavier District of the Tohono O'odham Nation, and Anaconda Arizona, is thrilled to have Sahuarita's newest park now open to the public!

'I'itoi Ki 'Ajij Wog Cicwi Jekkad, or Man in the Maze Trail Park, is a collaborative effort that began with the generous donation of a combined 80 acres of land from Freeport-Mc-MoRan and Anaconda Arizona. The project began as voluntary remediation at a long-dormant former industrial site. Today, local companies and the Toho-

no O'odham Nation, in partnership alongside our town, have realized a vision of creating an open space that benefits the whole community. This collaboration has resulted in a beautiful new trail park that celebrates both the natural desert landscape and honors the native cultural heritage of the area.

Man in the Maze Trail Park will be open daily from dawn until dusk and, along with a sprawling path of walking trails, includes features such as: Native Sonoran Desert plants, more than eight acres of pollinator habitat, natural and cultural heritage informational kiosks, and designated areas with Tohono O'odham traditional food plants and wappto (mesquite ramadas). Together, these features will allow visitors to wander the park as a self-guided educational experience.

"This effort has done more than transform a landscape; it has



our town, partner organizations, and the Tohono O'odham Nation," said Mayor Tom Murphy. "From the reclaimed wood used for the construction of wappto, to the excellent walking trails and waterwise planting, every detail has been laid with care."

Along with the care taken in designing the park and its features, care was also taken in selecting its name. In consultation with representatives from the Tohono O'odham Nation, community partners, and the Town of Sahuarita's Parks and Recreation Commission, as well as the community via a public survey, The Man in the Maze Trail Park was named after a symbol from Tohono O'odham culture of the same name. To many, the Man in the Maze represents a person's journey through life and the choices they must navigate along the way. Traditional themes of this emblem strengthened the bonds between include the cycle of life and death um, Bat Conservation International,

as well as finding balance and harmony in life while working towards one's goals and dreams.



"This site will stand as a tribute and legacy to our community and the many partners who made it happen," said Mayor Tom Murphy. "We are grateful to our friends at Freeport, Anaconda, Sonoran Desert MuseWildlife Habitat Council, Watershed Management Group, Tohono O'odham Nation, and many others who contributed to this project for

the enjoyment of today's and future generations."

We are excited for this park to become a place for recreation, education, community gatherings, and more. And now that the park is open, it is time for the memory-making to begin! To visit Man in the Maze Trail Park for yourself, enter the Municipal Complex via Starlight View Drive, proceed to the roundabout adjacent to Copper View Elementary School, then enter the Park by exiting the roundabout to the right just past the school.






Robert Deane Boysen, who was born on March 23, 1944, passed away March 10, 2024 at Tucson Medical Center surrounded by his loving family.

In fact, 90% of the work of The Red Cross is provided by volunteers and 90% of every dollar spent goes to delivering care and comfort to those in need.



Friends In Deed has been providing services to our Green Valley Senior Community for over 53 years. All services are free.

Our front desk volunteers arrange for the loan of durable medical equipment like walkers, wheelchairs, shower chairs, toilet risers and bed rails as well as many other devices needed for recuperation from surgery or a temporary medical condition. We also can arrange for transportation to doctor, dental or legal appointments, with a weeks notice. Our volunteer drivers pick up and return clients from their homes. Wheelchair vans for pick up are also available.

FID also has meeting rooms available to non-profit groups like HOA's as well as sewing, knitting, bereavement, and service clubs like Lions International. Our retired nurse volunteers hold blood pressure screenings every Tuesday and Friday morning.

She also organizes trips to special events like the 4th street fair, Rooster Cogburn's Ostrich Farm and restaurants like Opa, PF Changs and Silver Saddle Steakhouse. Be sure to go to FID-GV. You'll want to take part in our socials every Friday from 8:30 – 10:30am. These volunteers serve refreshments and there is live entertainment too. If you're lucky, you'll catch the day we celebrate "Birthday Friday" with cake for all. Again, there is no cost and reservations are not required.





MORE PASTA, BETTER KNEES?

f you're an avid pickleballer but have found yourself serving up more plates of pasta than you have been that yellow wiffle ball, pay attention to the following.

Because I see A LOT of pickleball players in my practice, presenting with knee pain. There are three tissues typically responsible for their issues:

- Ligament strain ligaments connect a bone to another bone
- 2. Meniscus tear the meniscus is the flexible cartilage within the knee
- 3. Articular cartilage injury, i.e. arthritis this is the cap of cartilage on the end of the bone.



Conventionally these types of injuries lead down a common path. NSAID medications to help pain, physical therapy to attempt to improve mechanics/strength to not stress the injured tissues as much, and when that fails it is often off to surgery.

Now here's the exciting news if you've tried some of the above and/or are not excited about the prospect of surgery.

In January 2024, leading scientists in orthopedic research published an article that was pretty mind-blowing. In short...

More pasta = less pain from knee arthritis.

Kinda, hah. The research was performed by an Italian group of researchers, with Italian patients, who eat plenty of pasta! And as you know, some of that pasta undoubtedly turns into something else within those patients - fat.

Here's the actual article title:

Autologous micro fragmented adipose tissue treatment of knee osteoarthritis demonstrates effectiveness in 68% of patients at 4-year follow-up (1)

Now, a fraction of that fat, not just in Italians, but in me and you as well, is useful for deriving healing stem cells and other growth factors. What scientists refer to as the "healing niche".

In this study patients had failed common interventions including:

- 1. Physical therapy
- 2. NSAIDs (non-steroidal anti-inflammatory drugs) such as ibuprofen or naprosyn
- 3. Cortisone injections

The patients underwent a diagnostic arthroscopy, i.e. a knee scope surgery, so that the extent of cartilage damage from the osteoarthritis could be directly visualized and characterized.

They then received a single injection of mFAT, or micronized fat (adipose) tissue taken from their own "fat storage depots" at the flank or abdomen.

I've been using this same type of treatment for more than 5 years in my practice as a component of our comprehensive full cellular treatments whereby we: 1) Draw your blood - to get another fraction of cells, platelets, 2) Extract a small fraction of fat from your side - to micro fragment as they did in this study, 3) Extract a small amount of bone marrow from your pelvic bone - where we can get actual stem cells

Let's break down why this treatment does what it does:

- 1. Platelets contain powerful healing growth factors
- 2. Adipose (fat) tissue also contains healing growth factors and other proteins, as well as a fraction of stem cells
- 3. Bone marrow contains a rich supply of stem cells in the body

When these cells are injected into an arthritic joint - in this study, the knee - the cells trigger a powerful healing cascade that turns down the "inflammatory chemistry" that makes an arthritic knee hurt.

This slows the downward degeneration that we know is typical of knee osteoarthritis, while stimulating some "micro-healing" of the damaged tissue - cartilage, meniscus, ligaments - at the surface level.

The endpoint, as shown in this study, is that there can be a significant pain reduction and functional improvement that is sustained in many subjects for years. Personally, I have patients that are more than 4 years out and still reporting pain relief and functional improvement with our version of this treatment.

Look, if a drug performed this well, i.e. a single dose lasted 4 years with 68% reported success in those patients, it would be a trillion-dollar drug.


This is the power in these treatments. This is also why the pharmaceutical industry is in an armsrace to find a way to bottle it up, scale it up, and sell it back to you through your insurance company! Perhaps that's 3-5 years out, maybe sooner.

Until then...Here's the takeaway.

Time is your most valuable resource because <u>time is tissue</u>. The longer one waits, the lesser the chance of these treatments helping. And the longer you are off the courts, course, or hiking trails — wondering if your knee may ever get better.

Early intervention is key in cases

of "knee going bad", that many let smolder for years .In many cases, we can return people to high-demand activities such as pickleball in 2-3 months.



In time these procedures may prevent the need for more invasive knee athroscopy or replacement surgery, and I think most patients would be completely fine with that!

If you've been sidelined with some form of "pickleballer's knee", which is often a combination of ligament and/or meniscus tears, with or without a dollop of knee arthritis, these treatments may be something for you to consider.

Now you're up to date, with research hotter than a heaping plate of pasta Arrabbiata.

This is what is available now and will only get better as we compile more compelling research and continue to advance the technology in this space.

If you love the outdoors and seeing tangible results of your volunteer labor, Green Valley Gardeners may be a good fit for you. This long-time Green Valley tradition was established in 1980 and has grown to be a large organi-

zation with educational seminars and workshops plus many hands-on projects, fundraising events and four area gardens where you can get your hands dirty.

Seminars with guest speakers are held monthly October through April each year. They are always open to the public at no charge.

Plant sales take place twice a year in spring and fall—one coincides

with the popular Art in the Park event at Desert Meadows Park.

The annual Garden Tour is held each spring, affording the opportunity to visit local gardens and get ideas for your own.

Arid Garden entrance.

The Ogden Community Garden in Sahuarita was established in 1983 and offers raised vegetable plots to members. Many harvest their produce and donate it to local Food Banks. This is the only GVG garden that is surrounded by a fence and a locked gate.

The Arid Garden (1986) is a demonstration garden of native and desert adapted plants open to the public at no charge. Each Friday morning, volunteers are on hand to work and to answer visitors' questions.

Historic Canoa Ranch gardens are operated in collaboration with Pima County and began restoration and cultivation in 2012. Stroll around this beautiful site, on the National Register of Historic Places. There is no charge for entry.

In 2014,a longtime dream of GVG came to fruition with the help of Freeport Mc-

Moran, the Desert Meadows Homeowners Association and the club membership—a beautiful park, Desert Meadows, was created in the middle of Green Valley along the historic Anza Trail. This certified arboretum includes a 60 plot community garden, 5 picnic areas and a variety of demonstration gardens. This peaceful spot is a haven for birdwatchers and dog walkers and has become a focal point for outdoor activities in the area.
