Join the 20th Anniversary Celebration on November 8th of Equine Voices

There's an ancient proverb that says "A Journey of a thousand miles begins with a single step". In this story, a journey that began with a dream has lasted 20 years! In the foothills of the Santa Rita Mountains, just south of Green Valley, a very special anniversary is being celebrated: the 20th anniversary of the founding of Equine Voices Rescue & Sanctuary. What started as a dream in 2004, with four baby horses, became a reality: a place of refuge for equines (horses, burros, mules) needing a home and care. Those four babies are known today as the Foundation Herd (see photo) and they continue to serve as ambassadors for Equine Voices to educate the public about the many dangers facing equines today.

The early years were not easy. Building something from the beginning is never an easy task but, founder, Karen Pomroy, knew something had to be done to save those equines who had been abandoned, abused, used in the production of the drug Premarin, those headed to slaughter, and those whose owners could no longer take care of them.

Over the years, there were many challenges but, with the support of dedicated volunteers and staff, generous donors, and community support, the Sanctuary has persevered. In 2008 Karen said: "Rescuing animals is a bitter sweet love affair. Offering these incredible beings, love, compassion and a new start,

has its ups and downs". She truly believes the beauty of running an equine rescue is watching their transformation. The gift of giving them new life makes it worth all the hard times. Seeing an equine that has been traumatized from abuse or abandonment, transformed from sadness to happiness and from hopelessness to hope, is an unforgettable experience. For those who could not be saved, the knowledge that they spent their last days surrounded by love and care, is comforting.

Today, the Sanctuary is also saving wild Mustangs who have been rounded up by the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) and uprooted from their homes in the wild. Most recently, two young Mustang mares, both with injuries, would likely have gone to slaughter had they not been rescued by Equine Voices. One of them was found to be pregnant and gave birth to a young colt on April 8th, the day of the eclipse. He was appropriately named Eclipse!

Over 20 years, Equine Voices has expanded from 5 to 25 acres and has rescued over 1,500 equines! Today, there are currently 50 horses, 6 burros, and 4 mules who call Equine Voices their home. Besides the cost of feed there are veterinary and dental costs, and farrier costs

for hoof care. In addition, more than half of the herd is over 20 years old, which is about 60 years old in human terms. They have all the needs of seniors including special feed, special diets, senior supplements, and medications. Staff and volunteers take care of all the resident equines every day, regardless of the weather. They ensure that the animals are well taken care of with love and all that they need to enjoy a happy, healthy life.

To commemorate the 20th anniversary, there will be a celebration on Friday, November 8th, from 4pm to 8:30pm, at the Casino del Sol Ca-

sino in Tucson. The "Black, Blue and Boots Gala" will feature a three-course meal, silent auction, live auction by Jennifer Henderson, live music by Ivan Orellana, and entertainment by Hardscrabble Road Band. All proceeds from this event will help provide hay, special feed, supplements and veterinary expenses for their rescued equines. 

FINDING THE RIGHT LANDSCAPE PROFESSIONAL

As with many things, finding the blowers are noisy and pollute the right person for the job is the key to success, satisfaction, and cost-effectiveness. This is certainly true of landscaping professionals. Each has a unique role, and hiring the right professional is crucial to ensuring you save time and money and are satisfied with the results. Let's look at the three landscape occupations, understand their qualifications, and learn what to look for when hiring them. They include landscape maintenance workers, landscape contractors, and landscape designers. Because landscape maintenance workers and landscape contractors are often referred to as "landscapers," I'm using separate titles to clarify their very different skill sets and roles.

Landscape **Maintenance Workers**

As the name implies, landscape

maintenance workers specialize in the upkeep of a landscape. Their services include pruning, raking, weeding, installing a few plants, and minor irrigation repairs. These valuable, time-saving services make your life easier, especially if gardening is not something you enjoy or are capable of. Most landscape maintenance companies offer services as needed or provide regular visits to help you keep your landscape looking its best.

However, not all landscape maintenance workers are created equal, and it's important to find a company that will tend to the health of your plants, not just do what is expedient. When hiring a landscape maintenance service, ask if they offer hand pruning, will rake rather than use a leaf blower, and hand pull weeds rather than spraying chemicals. Here's why.

Using electric hedge trimmers to shear plants is quicker and easier, allowing the landscaper to squeeze in more jobs but leaving you unattractive, unhealthy plants. You pay more upfront for selective hand pruning because it takes longer but reduces the need for additional pruning by half or more, so in the end, you save money. Leaf air. Raking allows the litter to be used as mulch around plants, saving water and providing soil nutrients to keep plants healthy. Chemical herbicides pollute air, water, and soil and harm birds, beneficial insects, soil micro-organisms, and non-target plants. For qualified landscape maintenance, find a SmartScape-certified landscaper through the University of Arizona's free training and certification program in best maintenance practices (www.smartscape.org) or ask your maintenance person to get certified.

Except for larger landscaping companies that employ both landscape contractors and maintenance crews, the typical, small landscape company lacks the licensure or training for larger landscaping projects. So, if you need more extensive work, then it's time to turn to a landscape contractor.

Landscape Contractors

Landscape contractors specialize in landscape construction projects. They should be your go-to if you need pavers, irrigation, water fea-

tures, or outdoor lighting installed. Most are also qualified to build outdoor kitchens and perimeter walls.

Arizona requires anyone doing more than \$1,000 in construction business to be licensed by the state's Registrar of Contractors (ROC). An exam tests the contractor's knowledge of the trade and the state laws governing industry. The ROC requires proof of an insurance bond, making sure homeowners can be compensated if damages are incurred on the job. The ROC also acts as an arbitrator to resolve disputes between homeowners and a licensed contractor. If

you plan on a major landscaping project, you can use the ROC website at az.roc.gov to see if the contractor's license is valid and if there are active complaints against them. Referrals from friends and neighbors are also a plus, allowing you to

> see their work and hear about their experience with the contractor.

> Landscape contractors are not taught design or horticulture, so it may be time to consult a landscape designer before hiring a contractor.

Landscape **Designers**

Landscape designers are trained in design, drafting, plants, construction materials and best practices. They typically charge a flat

fee based on the size and scope of the project. Because they are compensated for their time, not based on how much you spend on the project, a landscape designer can work with

your best interests in mind. Most designers start by spending time with clients to learn their tastes, wishes, and budget. Then, they customize a landscape plan to those desires.

If you start with landscape contractors, each will have a different idea of what should be done, each with a different price tag. This makes it difficult for homeowners to determine which idea is best. Having learned drafting, a landscape designer provides their clients with landscape plans that express their vision and allow them to get bids from contractors comparing apples-to-apples. This empowers homeowners to negotiate the best price for the work. The time and expertise of a good landscape designer can save clients money and enhance their satisfaction with the results.

When hiring a landscape designer, ask about their background and experience and review their portfolio to ensure their strengths match your needs. To ensure they have your best interests in mind, ask if they make money from your project in any way other than their design fee. For example, some designers make

commissions from suppliers or contractors when they refer a client, which creates a conflict of interest. It's important that their loyalty be to you.

The next time you have a landscape need, consider which of these landscape professionals is best for the job.

courtyard of GVR's West Center, the GVR Artisans' Shop might be the community's best kept secret. But no longer—the secret is out! Inside the front window dangle creative and colorful suncatcherslong strings of mirrors, beads, and glass that grab those intense Arizona rays and playfully cast them through the air, inside or out. The front lobby of the space boasts an astonishing array of art that includes striking photographs, delicately hand painted flora, fauna, and serene desert landscapes presented through various media. The gourd art, which includes intricate feathered masks and figurines, astonishes and delights. Fused glass and beaded plant stakes glimmer in the sunlight, and an array of impressive handmade textile items invite the senses to explore the colorful rich textures of clothing, aprons, places mats, table runners, and yes, even steering wheel covers to save any driver's hands from the intense heat of the summer sun. Small copper trees mounted on nature's own colorful rocks and stones are perched on spinning slatted towers that boast not only hand-painted inspirational miniplaques, but also intricately quilled artwork, photographs, paintings, and wood art.

Handmade lambskin leather crossbody bags in various sizes, embroidered with colorful and detailed designs, don an open archway into a larger space, replete with multiple glass showcases and shelves that are home to yet another treasure chest of handmade jewelry, fused glass art objects and serving pieces, handthrown pottery, laser cut wood art, and hand-woven baskets. At home in this space are myriad handmade textile items, ranging from hand-knitted watch caps and bright fabric checkbook covers to leatherbound and fabric clad journals to coin purses, placemats, and potholders. An adorable array of clothing and gift items for infants and children is also available here. In the GVR Artisan's Shop, there is something for everyone: the young, the elderly, and any age in between.

The unique and artistic jewelry includes items meticulously fashioned from copper, silver, beads, semi-precious stones and rocks set into one-of-a-kind necklaces, bracelets, and earrings. Handmade greeting and notecards created with unusual techniques such as *iris folding* and *ink washing* offer a special way to personalize any type of communication to a loved one or friend. Rumbling thunder gourds and lightly tinkling wind chimes, stunning fused glass and pottery serv-

One featured Artisan of the Month spends a Saturday in the shop to meet visitors and discuss his or her medium,





ing pieces, washable serving bowls fashioned from rope and delicately embroidered, leather and fabric coin purses, patterned and brightly colored beach bags and carrying cases, whimsical and colorful wind spinners—all of these amazing items and more are available at the shop.

Unlike many of the other GVR shops and clubs, the Artisans' Shop serves as a retail outlet for local artists, crafters, and members of other GVR clubs to display and sell their work. In exchange for their products being available in this unique venue, members of the club work two four-hour shifts per month (fewer in summer when

shop hours are reduced) and are occasionally asked to contribute homebaked goods for Sweet Saturdays, which offer free treats to customers as they browse through the magic of local art in the shop. Members also contribute an item or two during the year that become part of gift baskets presented to one lucky winner of a monthly drawing. Although not all, many of the members will accept custom orders as well. Twice each year, the shop holds a courtyard sale-one in the fall and one in the spring-when artists display and sell their work outside in the West Center inner and outer courtyards. The fall event fea-





tures holiday gift items, as well as products that are regularly available in the shop. The spring event is just in time for the variety of spring holidays celebrated and is the perfect place for seasonal residents and visitors to make those last-minute gift purchases for loved ones, friends, and neighbors back home.

For the first time this year, the GVR Artisans' Shop was open for four evenings in May to coincide with the *Movies under the Stars* film series produced by GVR. The shop provided ice cold water and free snacks to those attending the film series, and movie-goers were able to visit the

UNDERSTANDING RADIOLOGY ON YOUR HEALTH **CARE JOURNEY**

doctor your recommends an MRI, mammogram or other medical imaging, you may wonder why. Radiology is a medical specialty that uses imaging techniques to help diagnose and treat various health conditions. The images provide detailed information that can provide better diagnoses, better treatment options, and improved outcomes for patients. The following imaging techniques are frequently turned to for answers:

X-Ray imaging (radiography): most commonly used technique in radiology. How does it work? X-rays pass through tissue striking a detector to produce images of the structures inside the body. It's commonly used for diagnosing fractures, infections, and monitoring the progression of diseases.

Computed Tomography (CT): Combines multiple X-ray images taken from different angles and uses computer processing to create cross-sectional images of bones and soft tissues. CT scans provide key insights on internal structures, seeing shapes, sizes, densities, and texture. This information can help identify issues, pinpoint exact locations, and reveal important details that can aid in determining the best treatment plan.

Magnetic Resonance Imaging (MRI): Uses powerful magnetic fields, radio waves and a computer

to produce detailed organs, images of soft tissues, bones, and other internal body structures. MRI provides the best soft tissue contrast and can differentiate between fat, water, muscle and other soft tissues. MRI can also help monitor treatment plans to ensure patients are on the best path.

Ultrasound: Also known as sonography, uses high-frequency sound waves produce images of structures within the

body. The sound waves reflect off internal structures, and a computer processes the returning echoes to produce real-time moving images. Ultrasound is commonly used to evaluate organ structures as well as blood flow in arteries and veins.

PET: A PET scan, or positron emission tomography scan, utilizes radioactive material to create detailed images of the body's interior. The scanner creates computerized images that help detect changes in cell function. PET scans can help diagnose, monitor, and even treat a variety of conditions including cancer, heart disease and brain disorders.

Mammography: Uses computers and specially designed digital detectors to produce detailed X-ray images of breast tissue. The purpose of mammography is to identify breast cancer early in its development when it is more treatable and before a lump may even be felt through a self-exam



DEXA: Stands for Dual Energy X-Ray Absorptiometry and is the most commonly used test for measuring bone density. DEXA exams estimate the amount of bone mineral content by measuring the amount of X-rays that are absorbed.



Water Witching!! Do You Believe?

A common practice since the early1500's, water witching or dowsing has been used all over the world by everyone from small farmers to oil companies to help locate water and oil.

The dowser holds two rods, commonly made from metal or wood, out in front of them. They walk around the general area where a water well is desired and, when they're above a source of water, the rods will cross over one another. An alternate method is the use of a y-shaped rod held with the tip pointed up at a 45 degree angle. When over the water source, the tip of the rod will point downward. Few people can successfully perform this service. It requires someone with a gift. I certainly can't do it. The dowsing rods just hang limply in my hands.

My husband Harry and I learned about this in the early 1980's when we were farming and ranching in the Papalote Valley off the Arivaca Road. We had contracted with a local well driller who told us nothing could progress until he had

his water witch come out, witch the location and tell him where to drill — for an extra \$150.

Observing this procedure and being very skeptical, Harry wanted to try it for himself. They did several tests, each more difficult than the last, but each time, the rods he held crossed in the correct location.

During the final test, he was blindfolded and led completely out of the immediate area, spun around and misdirected before returning and having the rods cross again above the water source.

was terrified! This was something beyond explanation. It shocked the roots of his belief system — that something he couldn't see, hear, taste, touch, smell or feel could possibly exist.

As the years have gone by, we've been exposed to more examples of water witching. When the



Santa Cruz County Department of Transportation was going to widen the dirt road we lived on in Tubac, they wouldn't dig a hole until their water witch divined the location of the water pipes below. (Harry was able to find the pipes using their equipment as well).

Skeptics, of course, abound, helped along by charlatans who promote their abilities to find gold, hidden treasures and lost items — all at a

steep price.

This adds to the mysterious intrigue of water witching — but, as for us, we believe.

What Small Businesses Need to Know: U.S. Department of the Treasury and the New FinCEN Reporting Requirements

n an effort to enhance transparency and combat financial crimes, the Financial Crimes Enforcement Network (FinCEN) has implemented new reporting requirements that will impact small businesses across the United States. Effective from January 1, 2024, these requirements mandate certain businesses to report detailed information about their beneficial owners. This move is part of a broader initiative to crack down on money laundering, terrorist financing, and other illicit financial activities.

Understanding Beneficial Ownership

Beneficial ownership refers to the individuals who ultimately own or control a company. Under the new FinCEN rule, businesses must disclose personal details of anyone who directly or indirectly owns 25% or more of the company, as

well as those who exercise significant control over the business, regardless of their ownership stake. This includes individuals with substantial decision-making power or influence over the company's operations.

Key Reporting Requirements

Information to be Reported:

- Full legal name
- Date of birth
- Residential or business address
- A unique identifying number from an acceptable identification document (such as a passport or driver's license)

Who Needs to Report:

- Corporations, limited liability companies (LLCs), and other similar entities created or registered to do business in the United States.
- Certain types of entities are exempt, including publicly trad-

ed companies, governmental entities, and inactive entities that meet specific criteria.

Timing and Frequency:

- Existing businesses must comply by January 1, 2025.
- New businesses formed after January 1, 2024, must report within 30 days of their formation
- Changes in beneficial ownership must be reported within 30 days.

Implications for Small Businesses


For small businesses, these new requirements present both challenges and opportunities. On the one hand, complying with the reporting mandates might seem burdensome, especially for those with limited administrative resources. On the other hand, these regulations aim to create a fairer and more transparent business environment, which can benefit honest small business own-

ers in the long run.

Conclusion

The new FinCEN reporting requirements mark a significant shift in the regulatory landscape for small businesses in the United States. By mandating the disclosure of beneficial ownership information, the government aims to increase transparency and reduce the risk of financial crimes. Small businesses must take the necessary steps to comply with these regulations, recognizing that the long-term benefits of a transparent and secure business environment outweigh the initial challenges. ummertime brings its own challenges to the Green Valley Resource Center of the Community Food Bank. A recent Tuesday morning brought a rush of people right when the doors opened at 9am

Volunteers and staff moved quickly to help check people in and then guide them as they chose which food they wanted in their cart. Roy Aguilar, the new manager of the Green Valley Resource Center, says that will be the way things go as the summer unfolds. "We get a big rush in the morning. Everyone wants to get here before it gets hot." Roy started in Green Valley as Warehouse Supervisor 11 years ago. In May he was promoted to Resource Center Manager of Green Valley and Amado.

One of his priorities for the Green Valley Resource Center is to build awareness in the community.

Roy recognizes that when people stop in for food, they may also need other help. Staff members from Valley Assistance Services are often at the resource center to tell people more about their programs which range from finance education and assistance, to friendly phone calls and visits, and even a fall prevention program.

A stop at the food bank can also bring the chance to pick up child or adult size diapers, pet food, get help in applying for SNAP (food stamps) or even make a short visit to the UA Health Clinic, which makes monthly visits. Picking up food is a primary goal, but there are many other resources to help people. Roy says he is looking to expand those kinds of partnerships. "We can't do everything, so we want to know who can be a referral," Roy comments.

Roy brings an extensive grocery background to the Resource Center. He started bagging groceries when he was 15 and a half years old, and worked his way up in a training program at a major grocery chain to hold the position of co-manager.

Joyce stopped in after the immediate morning rush was over to pick up food. She's been coming to the Green Valley Resource Center for the past year, after learning about it from a neighbor. She has a daughter who is disabled who just moved in. "I worked all my life but still once you get to retirement you can need help. Usually what I do is I have a code of conduct for myself. I never take what I can't use. I only come once a month. We're very grateful for what we get. I grew up on a farm in North Carolina. I know how to make food last." Joyce was surprised to learn that frozen catfish was being offered when she visited in June. "Both my daughter and I were pleasantly surprised at the taste of the fish sticks last month," she says. "It's always a surprise."

Joyce was helped through the process by Linda, who retired as a hair stylist after 40 years. Now Linda spends one morning a week volunteering at the Green Valley Resource Center. "I love it. It's about the people. I see how many people are in need."

Donna is a fellow volunteer who started giving her time after her church held a couple of food drives. She comes in once a week to help. "I meet lots of people," she says. "They're from all walks of life. Everyone is so grateful. I feel we're very welcoming. We're here to help." Donna recruited her husband Dennis to volunteer also. He

works once a week in the warehouse, checking the condition and expiration dates of donated food. "I needed something to do," Dennis says. "I get the job done and go home. The only problem is when people are cleaning out their closets. Earlier I had a whole cart of food but it was dated 2013-14." As a partner of Feeding America, the Community Food Bank has to follow strict food safety guidelines. Expiration dates are checked on every food item that is donated.

If it's more than a year past the date shown on a can, the food cannot be distributed. For a box or package of food, the time period is shorter – six months. The Community Food Bank also cannot distribute badly dented or bloated cans, or packaging that is already open.

Beyond that, Dennis sees a wide variety of items come in. "It's anything and everything," he says. "I got a bag of new paintbrushes this morning. I don't have a problem with that." Donated items that are not food are often sent to partner agencies who can utilize them.

Dennis and Donna moved here from California six years ago after reading about Green Valley in a magazine article about the best places to retire. "I have no regrets whatsoever," says Dennis, who retired from the Navy. "Even with the heat."

It's a lively group of about seven volunteers this morning, and they take care of the morning rush. Sharlene is a nursing student here to volunteer and write a paper about it for her nutrition class. "I would definitely say it's a very humbling experience," she says. "There are people who need services but they're still happy. They 're still kind. Everyone here is very kind. I live in Tucson, but I chose to come to Green Valley. I'm interested in the culture here. When you work or go to school full time it makes you realize whatever you can give is definitely very rewarding."

Volunteers expand the work of the five staff members at the Green Valley Resource Center. Besides offering a unique "grocery shopping experience" where people can choose the food they like, the Green Valley team also closes up shop on Thursdays to head to the Amado Resource Center and open it up for food distribution from 9am – 4:30pm.

The Community Food Bank of Southern Arizona has been a presence in the Green Valley/Sahuarita community since 1978. In 2003, the Community Food Bank opened at its current location on Continental Road. The partnership formed decades ago between Green Valley Community Church and the Community Food Bank means that in a year, the Green Valley Resource Center can serve about 7500 people from more than 2,000 households. Of those served, about 29% are children under 18 and 22% are seniors over 60.



From Restauranteur to Outdoor Living, David Lin Goes with the Flow

outhern Arizona's climate allows us to spend time in our backyards or on the patio year-round, albeit at different times of the day, depending on the heat. But who wants to sit outside and look at a barren landscape?

That's where Lin Outdoor Living steps in.

David Lin is the owner of Lin Outdoor Living. His name may not be familiar in the context of landscaping, but it will. He is also the owner of Panda House in Continental Plaza.

At Sahuarita High School, David participated in the Pima County JTED auto mechanic program. He worked in an auto shop for a year or two, which gave him experience in motors. From there, he learned plumbing piping and the intricacies of water flow. His hands-on experience filled him with a lot of knowledge that, come 2020, would shape his career.

During the pandemic when business was slow at Panda House, David worked on waterscapes and water features for his house, and the ideas started to flow. He wanted to create something for his family to enjoy while in lockdown, and an outdoor kitchen and gazebo fit the bill. It was then that Lin's Pond Design was born.

He changed the name to Lin Outdoor Living and became licensed by the Arizona Registrar of Contractors in January 2024. He changed the company's name when he added new products and services.

"Before, I was just doing the water features. Now, we offer outdoor kitchens, turf, and whole backyard packages," David says.

After posting his creations on social media and advertising water features, he received requests from homeowners who wanted to hire him to create ponds in their backyards.

"I am locally owned. People trust me and my workmanship.

One of the features that makes Lin Outdoor Living unique is the company is the only Certified Aquascape Contractor in Southern Arizona. That means he has trained extensively to properly install Aquascape products.


The Projects & Process

After the initial inquiry, the customer is invited to David's home to see the projects he has to offer. Seeing his creations in person allows customers to envision how something similar can look in their yard.

"I invite people to my house because it's like a showcase," he beams.


Depending on the scope of the project, it is completed in sessions. David recommends ponds or water features first because it is messier to install the water reservoir than patios and turf. Shaded areas and the outdoor kitchen are added next. The process could take three weeks to a month. Single-product projects generally take three to four days to complete.

David says the most important thing people should consider when redesigning their outdoor living spaces is the view of the house. He needs to know how he will





access the yard, whether the construction equipment will fit, the size of the project, and the budget.

He says many customers want water features, but that involves a lot of labor and digging, which increases the cost.

Customers who want a koi pond must consider space, maintenance, and predators.

"If they live in an area with predators, we can install a fish cave or netting so the koi can hide from them."

Artificial turf is trending, according to David. He also gets a lot of requests for water features with fountains, bubbling rocks, and the boater with piping water spurting out.

"They are easy to install compared to koi pond," he notes. "I get a lot of requests for pondless waterfalls, too."

The Price

Lin Outdoor Living offers a variety of design packages.

On average, David says his customers spend \$28,000 on their projects. The most common package is a water feature, turf, and outdoor kitchen.

The cost can run between \$50,000 to \$100,000, depending on how expensive the materials the customers choose are.

Seasonal Work

With a crew of three to four people, David's work is seasonal. He does provide quotes and consultations outside of the winter visitor season. Because the restaurant is busy from November to the end of April, they do not take on projects but can do maintenance. Projects start around March and continue to the beginning of November.

Flowing Into The Future

Business is better than good because he is the only Aquascape contractor in the area.

He says that last year, he tore out at least 10 concrete ponds installed by other contractors that were cracked or had leaks, which caused a lot of damage.

The Aquascape liner, he claims, lasts a long time. It is safe for fish and will last for a lifetime.

David cautions that if homeowners hire someone not licensed by the Arizona Registrar of Contractors or are not properly trained to do the work, they will likely use cheap materials and overcharge.

"Do your homework to find a contractor to do the work," he says. "I have to train my people before they can go out. I want to make sure they do a good job. It is our responsibility to provide the customer with a good experience, and my team knows that. That is why they are trained."

Since diving into outdoor living design, David has learned that he needs to learn from his mistakes.

"Everybody makes mistakes. If I make a mistake, I will fix it, and learn from it. Under the workmanship standards, if anything goes wrong with my work, I will provide a two-year warranty and fix it at no charge."

Coming down the pipeline, David expects homeowners will redo their water features installed by other contractors.

"The more you try to fix it, the more it will cost you. So just take it out and put in a new one," he suggests.

With all these considerations, David hopes to expand to Tucson and Nogales. As an Aquascape contractor, he can lean on his counterparts to help with projects outside the Green Valley/Sahuarita area.

Whether they are recreational swim ponds, custom water features, or koi ponds, with his experience, he can do it.

"We have a good variety of customers. We offer yard service and concrete work, tile installation, and can build firewalls, too," he promotes.

David's wish is to open a showroom where the public can see everything Lin Outdoor Living offers, including a retail store.





AI-NON-SURGICAL ORTHOPEDIC TREATMENTS??

ou can't flip through news headlines today and not see something about AI (Artificial Intelligence) and how it is radically changing just about every industry on the planet.

Across industries companies are using AI in an attempt to streamline efficiencies. From ordering a hamburger in the drive thru which by the way McDonald's has already abandoned due to colossally frustrating their customers. To use for predictive analysis of liquid biomarkers to detect cancer before it is even detectable at stage 1 on an imaging study.

Even reading your mind! I'm not joking. A recent article published in Nature reported on scientists now being able to interpret brain signals and converting them to speech. A mind-blowing technologic achievement to aid and assist people with speech deficits.

It is certainly in the infant stages, however AI will revolutionize much of what we are doing "manually" today.

So how is this impacting my specialty in Orthopedics?



In quite a few ways! From early osteoarthritis disease detection by interpreting a combination of lab biomarkers and very subtle imaging findings that would trigger treatments to intervene sooner. To later stage disease interventions, using this technology and big data to determine more precisely the specifications of knee and hip replacement implants best suited to the individual having surgery. Even after care models of rehabilitation or identifying when someone may have problems such as loosening of a surgical implant.

You are witnessing an evolution in medicine that will transform every

aspect of healthcare, and hopefully for the better. So that more time and focus can be returned to the human aspect of the interactions with patients. Because fortunately we're not quite ready to replace doctors and nurses with robots!

Now, on to something I want to update you with today.

A different version of AI that I'm using in my non-surgical Orthopedic Regenerative Medicine practice. For more than a decade I've been using PRP (platelet rich plasma) and stem cell treatments to stimulate healing of injuries. In many of these cases, when treated early in the injury/degenerative disease cycle, we see fantastic results with pain reduction and functional improvements. Returning function, independence, and for a lot of patients – the ability to avoid surgical interventions all together.

Now to be clear, I'm not saying that these will replace the need for surgery. Some cases are not appropriate for these tools and treatments, so the right thing is to move them along to one of my surgical Orthopedic colleagues.

Back to my practice now and how we are using a different form of AI to get better and faster results with our patients. What we are calling AI-Orthobiologic Treatment. In this context AI stands for Augmented, Integrative, and Orthobiologics referring to cellular injection interventions such as PRP and stem cell treatments.

Two technologies we are now integrating, to augment our treatments:

- 1. Extracorporeal shockwave treatment (ESWT), a.k.a. Shockwave treatment
- 2. Class IV laser

Extracorporeal shockwave therapy (ESWT) was first introduced in the medical field in the early 1980s for the treatment of kidney stones (lithotripsy). The application of ESWT for orthopedic conditions began in the late 1980s and early 1990s.

In the past 15 years, extracorporeal shockwave therapy (ESWT) has emerged as a leading option for the efficient treatment of musculoskeletal disorders such as:

- tendinopathy/tendinitis (rotator cuff, hip/gluteal tendonopathy, achilles, patellar tendon)
- lateral and medial epicondylitis (tennis and golfer's elbow)
- calcific tendinitis (rotator cuff, achilles tendon)

Lasers for medical/therapeutic purposes have been around since the 1960s, the first documented use of high-power Class IV laser in Orthopedics in the early 2000s. In 2002, a pivotal study by Mester et al. demonstrated the effectiveness of high-intensity laser therapy in reducing pain and promoting tissue repair in musculoskeletal conditions.

In the United States, the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has approved several specific shockwave and laser devices for these treatments.


I'll spare you the deep-level physics on both technologies to keep this high level today.

Extracorporeal Shockwave Therapy (ESWT): Uses high-energy acoustic (sound) waves to induce microtrauma, which promotes blood flow, stimulates cell regeneration, and reduces pain by initiating the body's natural healing processes.

Class 4 Laser Therapy: Uses high-intensity light for photobio-modulation of tissues enhancing mitochondrial activity, promoting cell activity, release of growth factors, and tissue regeneration. It reduces inflammation and pain by modulating inflammatory mediators

and increasing circulation.

Bringing this full circle to non-surgical treatment options for stubborn osteoarthritis of the knee.



Cellular treatments including PRP and stem cell, like any other technology, have improved over the past decade that I've been deploying them in my practice.

Stacking ESWT and laser treatment on top of these treatments has been shown to augment and accelerate the results. Deeper and more complete healing equals more and longer lasting pain relief.

What we are now seeing in clinical practice is that Orthobiologic procedures using "AI" Augmented and Integrative treatments with ESWT and Class 4 medical-grade laser therapy can offer superior clinical outcomes for pain reduction and tissue healing compared to one treatment used alone.

That is why I'll remain laser focused staying on the leading edge of these technologies in my practice. To accelerate and enhance healing, to help more patients pain less, so that they can live more – and hopefully without surgery.





The Secret Waters of Montezuma Well

orning sun glints off the a national monument water at Montezuma Well. Ducks glide across the surface, occasionally diving with a flip of tail feathers. I'm standing on the rocky overlook where I see ancient cliff dwellings tucked in an alcove, the pond, and mountains beyond. It's a peaceful scene, but I'm not fooled in the least.

I know when the sun sets, the seemingly placid waters teem with thousands of leeches. These endemic invertebrates don't suck blood like their slimy brethren, instead snacking on amphipods, which are tiny crustaceans. Still, the thought of leech hordes snaking through dark waters searching for meat is enough to give me the willies.

When a castle is not a castle

While many Arizonans have visited imposing Montezuma Castle, an exquisitely-preserved five-story cliff dwelling in Camp Verde, only a fraction will continue to Montezuma Well, which lies 11 miles northeast.

First, let's get something straight. It's not really a castle and Montezuma didn't build it. The 20-room structure is however, one of the best-preserved examples of Native American architecture in the country. The prehistoric high rise is the very definition of a cliff dwelling, tucked into a limestone alcove 100 feet above the canyon floor. Montezuma Castle was built by the Sinagua people more than 800 years ago high above the Beaver Creek floodplain. The first Euro-American explorers to discover it presumed that anything so complex must be Aztec in origin, hence the name.

Montezuma Castle was designated

on December 8, 1906. It was one of America's first four national monuments. But just as startling as the manmade wonder of the castle is the natural wonder of Montezuma Well. It's an unexpected oasis carved from the earth's skin. On this warm summer day, I'm drawn to the dark waters of the well, which is a detached unit of Montezuma Castle National Monument.

Still waters run deep

What appears to be a quiet pond is actually

a limestone sinkhole formed by the collapse of an underground cavern. Subterranean springs replenish the well, pumping out 1.5 million gallons of water each day. Yet the well doesn't overflow because there is an opening that drains off the water. Like a bowl with a crack near the brim, water flows through a limestone cave where most ends up in Beaver Creek. Some is also channeled off by an ancient canal system built by the Sinagua. They used this to irrigate crops. You can still see their small cliff dwellings perched atop a sheltered ledge above the

Because of the water's high concentration of carbon dioxide, fish can't live in the well. But that doesn't mean that the pond isn't filled with life. In fact, Montezuma Well actually supports five endemic species—plants and animals that exist nowhere else in the world. It

likely contains the highest concentration of endemic species of any single spring in North America—a single-celled plant called a diatom, a tiny snail, a water scorpion, an amphipod that resembles a miniature shrimp, and a predatory leech.

At dusk, the seemingly calm waters churn with thousands of leeches rising from the depths to feed on the amphipods. The amphipods try to survive by limiting movement and resting on plants at night. Although they can't get too comfortable because the water scorpions live in the weed beds along the shore and enter the open water in the darkness to hunt the tasty amphipods.

The thought of dark waters full of leeches always reminds me that it's time once again to watch Attack of the Giant Leeches, a 1959 low budget and unintentionally hilarious sci-fi film. I don't want to spoil it but the leeches appear to be played by men in Hefty trash bags


with suckers glued on. And if that doesn't make you reach for the popcorn, then you and I are very different people.

A shady oasis


A paved, signed path climbs a short hill to an overlook of the well, which is almost 400 feet in diameter. A short spur trail comprised mostly of steps, leads down through tangled greenery and jumbled boulders to the edge of the pond, where the water spills into an underground stream. At the base of the limestone wall is a cave and the remains of a Sinagua dwelling.

Climb back up the steps to join the main trail, which traces the rim before gently descending a grassy slope dotted with cactus. At the bottom of the hill the trail continues on to the parking area. But if you return without taking the short

spur trail to the outlet, you'll miss a magical part of your visit.

Follow the path into a dark tunnel of trees for one of those amazing Arizona moments. Step out of the scorching summer sun and immerse yourself in a cool and shady sliver of paradise. The trail hugs the cool limestone wall beneath a jungle-dense canopy of trees. Water flows past in a canal built more than

1,000 years ago. Just beyond the canal and the dense undergrowth is Beaver Creek. Temperatures plunge in this riparian refrigerator. It's often 20 degrees cooler here than on the rim.

In Arizona we're accustomed to varied climates stacked at differing elevations but they are generally spread out over a few miles, not a few steps. In all my travels around the state, I can't think of a single place where the climate and scenery changes so abruptly. I love being here in summer, inhaling that

sweet chilled air. Even the leeches can't keep me away.

When you go

Montezuma Well: Take I-17 to Exit 293. Continue through the towns of McGuireville and Rimrock, following the signs four miles to the park entrance. Free admission. 928-567-3322, www.nps.gov/moca.

Montezuma Castle: \$10 per person. Children aged 15 and under are free. 928-567-3322, www.nps.gov/moca.



What QR Codes Are and How To Use Them

ou have seen the image everywhere. On TV and print ads, billboards, flyers, product packaging, and stickers on restaurant tables telling you to "Scan Me," what is that black and white square that looks like a funky crossword puzzle, and why do you scan it?

What is a QR Code?

That funky-looking box is a QR Code. It may seem as if QR codes are relatively new, but they aren't. The QR Code, which stands for Quick Response, was invented in 1994 by Denso Wave, a Japanese company and subsidiary of Toyota. Then, the purpose of the QR Code was to track vehicles and parts as they moved through the manufacturing process. Today, they are used for online shopping, boarding a flight, movie theater tickets, restaurant menus, and many other uses too long to list.

QR Codes are the genius cousin of barcodes. They store more and different types of information and encode phone numbers or internet addresses.

There are two types of QR Codes; static and dynamic.

A static QR Code cannot be changed once created and may not allow for analytics on how many times the code may have been scanned.

A dynamic QR Code can be modified as often as needed, has design options, and tracks and measures advertising statistics.

... and that's about as techie as we will get here.

How does a QR Code work?

A smartphone or tablet is used as a QR Code scanner, displaying the code and converting it to a standard URL for a website, you know, the www. that you type in the browser. The codes give an instant link to a specific web page within a website for the product or service being advertised.

Who is using QR Codes?

The short answer is millions of people.

According to an AARP article in February 2023, QR code usage surged early in the pandemic as restaurants tossed paper menus in fear of COVID-19 contamination. Half of full-service restaurants added digital menus accessed through QR codes by the end of 2020, according to a National Restaurant

Association survey.

Businesses use QR codes in advertising campaigns to direct consumers to product information or special offers.

How to Scan a QR Code

Scanning a QR Code depends on the type and age of the device you use for scanning. You must have a scanning app on your phone or tablet. Most come with them installed. Google Lens is built into many Android devices, allowing users to point their camera at a QR code to scan it. If you have an older phone, don't use your camera because it may not be secure. Download a free app with good reviews from Google Play or the Apple Store.

Before you scan, find out where the QR code is coming from.

Check for signs of tampering.

Does the QR Code on the material look original and fit with the design? The original QR Code may have been replaced with a sticker of a malicious one, particularly when scanning QR Codes from print materials in public places.

If all looks good:

1. Open the device and point the camera at the code. It doesn't matter if the phone is vertical or horizontal. The phone can read the code upside down.

- 2. The web address you see as you hover over the code should be something you expect, a company's website or a restaurant's menu, for example.
 - **3.** The camera will automatically scan the QR code and populate an icon or web address on the screen near the code. Tap it.
 - **4.** After tapping, the phone's web browser should automatically launch the webpage.

Once you've scanned the QR Code and are redirected to a website, use the same verification process on the website. Verify the company and given URL.

- Does this company look legitimate?
- Does the design look professional?
- Does the QR Code match?

QR Code Security & Quishing

The software used to generate QR Codes does not collect personal information from users. However, the location, time of a scan, number of times a code is scanned, and the operating system of the device that scanned the code can be accessed by the code's creators.

A QR code can't be hacked, but a hacker can generate a malicious QR Code that sends you to a fake website where they'll steal your personal data and track your location. To prevent that from happening:

- Check the URL and see if it's composed strangely, differs from the website graphics, or has two different names.
- Do not provide personal information if directed to another website.
- Red flags should wave if you are asked to make a financial transaction using a QR code. Don't do it!

Why you may want to create a QR Code.

If you coordinate events such as fundraisers, concerts, community activities, or anything where attendees need to access more information or buy tickets, set up a QR Code. It will make it easier for people to find your website or event page than typing in a website address.

<u>QR Code Generator</u> is one free tool to help you set up a QR Code.

Understanding why and how to use QR Codes is just one more step into the ever-expanding digital age.

A note on QR Codes from the SAV SCAM SQUAD

Green Valley Sheriff Auxiliary Scam Squad warned the community about "quishing." This new scam involves nefarious hackers obtaining your sensitive information through QR Codes.

Many quishing attacks are now showing up in email inboxes. You will see a QR Code and a message on how urgent it is for you to scan the code immediately to get whatever phony bargain is being advertised. A sense of urgency is always a scammer's tool. When you scan the QR Code you will not find a great bargain, but your phone will be loaded with malware that will allow the criminal access to whatever else is on your phone.

The Federal Trade Commission reported a more than 500% increase in complaints of scam texts from 2015 to 2022. Their report in October said social media scams accounted for a combined \$2.7 billion loss for Americans between January 2021 and June 2023.

Your best defense against quishing is to simply not scan a QR Code unless you are absolutely sure it's legitimate. Never scan a code from an unexpected email or text, or advertising you see on the street.

Sahuarita's First Bond Package: What It Means For You

Community Recreation and Infrastructure Projects

ince Sahuarita's incorporation as a Town in 1994, the number of residents has increased by over 1900%. The Mayor and Council consider it the Town's responsibility to ensure sufficient infrastructure is in place to support Sahuarita's current and anticipated population. With input from Town planning processes, community research, and citizen feedback, Town staff recommended projects for a general obligation (GO) bond package.

The projects, related to recreation and infrastructure, will appear on the November 5, 2024 General Election ballot for voter approval. It is the intent of the Mayor and Council of the Town to fund the various projects described here.

What is a general obligation (GO) bond?

GO bonds are commonly used by municipalities to fund public improvement and infrastructure projects using a secondary property tax to retire the bonds. Similar to a home mortgage, selling bonds allows municipalities to build a facility or public infrastructure project now, and then pay for them over time.

What are the bond projects?

Recreation Projects

 Multigenerational Recreation Center: Construction of a new recreational hub for the community containing aquatics facilities, gymnasium, cardio and

- weight training, multipurpose rooms, and other recreational amenities.
- *Trails Development*: Connect the community for pedestrians and cyclists through expansion of the trails system with associated amenities in accordance with the 10-year Parks and Recreation Master Plan.
- Anamax Park Field Improvements: Improvements to the ball fields at Anamax Park are expected to include artificial turf, batting cages, replacement bleachers, and a new concession stand.
- additional pickleball courts, 10-12 new handball/racquetball courts, and 8-10 gaga ball pits, all public, with lighting, seating, restrooms, and supporting features are planned to be installed at an existing Town of Sahuarita park location.

Infrastructure Projects

• Police Department Building Expansion: A two-story addition to the north wing of the Police Department building to accommodate Police Department growth for the next 10-15 years. The expansion will also include replacement of major mechanical systems that are nearing the end of their useful life.

- Public Works Maintenance Building: Construction of a 2,900 square foot office/administrative space and a 1,500 square foot two-bay garage facility where Public Works staff can perform fleet maintenance operations for Public Works vehicles plus store equipment and materials.
- Town Hall Efficiency Remodel and Capacity Enhancements:
 Renovations include interior remodeling of the building to accommodate projected staff growth for the next 20 years and reflect current technology needs, such as video conferences. The remodel will also include the replacement of HVAC, plumbing, and electrical systems and components, as well as technology and security upgrades.

What are the bond program features?


- New health and wellness activities, recreational opportunities, and community gathering spaces.
- Facilitates increase in police services to the community.
- Expected increased capacity for programming, services, and Town staff to accommodate continued growth of Sahuarita.
- Delays the need to build new, more costly, Town facilities.

What will the bond package cost?

If approved, the proposition will authorize the issuing of \$66 million of GO bonds to enhance community safety and improve quality of life through parks and recreation, police/public safety and infrastructure improvements. By issuing GO bonds, the Town agrees to pay the bondholders back over time through secondary property taxes.

Pima County calculates that the average assessed valuation for homes in the Town of Sahuarita is \$232,067. Using this average figure, the monthly cost for a homeowner in the Town would be \$17.12.






